BE SAFE

To be safe, develop a safety plan. Consider these first steps.

If you are in immediate danger, you can contact 911 for police or other emergency assistance, regardless of your immigration status or the status of the person hurting you.

If you are in an unsafe situation, call one of the victim service agencies or hotlines listed on this brochure. You do not have to give your name or any other identifying information. They may be able to offer you shelter, counseling, and access to legal services.

Keep copies of your identity documents,

documents related to your immigration status, and copies of important documents or photographs related to what happened.

If your home is not a safe place, consider keeping copies at the home of a friend.

If the person who hurt you is your spouse or intimate partner, consider seeking a Protection from Abuse Order with the assistance of a local agency.

BE INFORMED

Many victims feel afraid to seek help because they are worried about the legal consequences of doing so.

IMMIGRATION LEGAL ISSUES

Many immigrant victims of crimes and domestic violence can apply for immigration legal status on their own, independent from their abusers. There are federal laws to protect you. If you qualify, a free attorney can meet with you confidentially to review your situation and to discuss options.

FAMILY LAW ISSUES

If you are concerned about how to obtain a divorce, how to deal with custody or visitation rights or how to seek child or spousal support, a family law attorney trained in dealing with sensitive situations may be able to assist you.

OTHER LEGAL ISSUES

An attorney may also be able to help you find legal help with housing and other difficult legal issues.

START A NEW LIFE

You deserve to live a life free of violence, regardless of your immigration status. It may seem scary, but you can make a change and there are local agencies that can help.
